State Principals Conference Leading for Excellence

Last fortnight, Clare, Elise and I attended the Government Schools Principals Conference, which focused on the theme "Excellence in Every Classroom." The day provided a valuable opportunity for school leaders to strengthen collaborative practices across networks, with a shared goal of driving school improvement and enhancing student outcomes.

The keynotes and workshops aligned with several statewide priorities, including:

- Teaching and learning (with a focus on the Victorian Teaching and Learning Model 2.0)
- Wellbeing and engagement
- Cultural inclusion
- Network collaboration
- Leadership
- Engaging and working with community

We heard from speakers, including the Minister for Education Ben Carroll, North Melbourne Football Club President Dr. Sonja Hood, and Deputy Secretary Dr. David Howes, alongside a variety of educators and system leaders.

Mathematics Version 2.0 and Student Reporting

The Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) recently published its revised mathematics curriculum (Mathematics curriculum 2.0).

All Victorian government schools will start using the Mathematics curriculum 2.0 in 2024 or 2025. At Glen Waverley South Primary School, we are using the revised mathematics curriculum for school reporting from Semester 1, 2025.

On your child's previous report, the teacher reported against the 3 strands of the achievement standard for mathematics (Number and Algebra, Measurement and Geometry, and Statistics and Probability). Under the Mathematics curriculum 2.0, your child's teacher will report against the achievement standard as a whole, providing a single, aggregated score.

As the achievement standards reported on have changed, the first time you receive a report under the Mathematics 2.0 curriculum, it will only show achievement and not progress. For all reports after this, progress will be shown against the single achievement standard.

The VCAA made these changes to help teachers plan their teaching and learning programs in mathematics, giving them more flexibility to support students to link ideas within mathematics and also with other curriculum areas.

Spotlight on STEM

Food Tech is officially underway for students in Levels 3 and 4. They started by brewing and tasting Lemon Myrtle Tea during National Reconciliation Week. Then, students showed off their skills by peeling, coring, and chopping apples to make Slow Cooker Apple Butter. This recipe was a huge hit with almost all students asking for more! You can see some photos on the following pages. Students also had the opportunity to taste test a variety of different apples as they learned about the benefits of eating seasonal food.

Slow Cooker Apple Butter recipe

- 2.5 kg apples any variety works fine, we used Fuji apples
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 Tbsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. ground cloves

(We used 2 Tbsp Mixed Spice rather than individual spices)

- 1. Peel, core and slice the apples.
- 2. Add the apples to the slow cooker. Add the brown sugar and spices.
- 3. Stir to cover all the apple pieces in the sugar and spice mixture.
- 4. Cover and cook on HIGH for 5 hours or LOW for 8-10 hours.
- 5. After the apples have cooked, use an immersion blender to blend to a smooth consistency.

If you don't have a slow cooker, you can prepare this recipe on the stovetop. You will just need to stir regularly until the apples are soft.

If you don't have an immersion blender, you can mash the apples or use a stand mixer.

If you have a lot of liquid in your apples, you can strain some of it before blending. You can always add some liquid in again if your apple butter is too thick.

How can I use my apple butter?

Some suggestions from the students after tasting the apple butter were:
Spread on toast, muffins, scones or croissants
Dip biscuits into it
Put it on ice-cream while it is warm
Use it in milkshakes
Mix some into plain yoghurt
